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## Preteen Vaccine Week 2012: New Video, Tdap Informing

February 12-18 is Preteen Vaccine Week (PVW), a statewide observance to remind parents to bring their preteen in for a check-up and *all* age-appropriate immunizations!

# Tdap Law - Now for 7<sup>th</sup> Graders Only

The Immunization Branch reminds parents, students, health care providers, and education partners that starting July 1, 2012, and annually thereafter, *all* students



going into 7th grade must have proof of having had the Tdap booster shot before starting school unless they have a documented exemption.

The law applies to all public and private schools. The 2012-13 school year differs from 2011-12, when the law also included a catch-up requirement for 8<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> graders. It's also important to note that, unlike last summer, there is currently no 30-day grace period for school entry in the existing law.

The Immunization Branch **encourages current 6<sup>th</sup> graders to get their routine immunizations, including Tdap**, <u>now</u> ahead of the back-to-school rush this summer. To help with this message, new and updated resources include:

- Updates to <u>ShotsForSchool.org</u> to reflect the new 7<sup>th</sup>grade-only requirement. Resources on the site include updated FAQs for <u>schools</u> and <u>parents</u>.
- Messages for schools with current 6<sup>th</sup> graders. Visit <u>ShotsforSchool.org</u> to find <u>flyers</u> for schools to send home with students and sample <u>phone messages</u> for parents.
- Promotional resources, including a downloadable <u>web banner</u> for a school's homepage and template <u>newsletter article</u> to reach parents.

# Late Season Flu Vaccination Still Important

Tragically, an adult male from Kern County was the first recorded death from influenza this season. This is a somber reminder to Californians that flu is dangerous, even in winter and spring, when



news about flu becomes less visible and the motivation to get a flu shot can weaken.

Influenza disease typically peaks between January and March. Consider using a <u>Shot by Shot flu</u> <u>story</u> to educate local communities about the potentially deadly risks of flu and to remind them to get themselves and their family members vaccinated.

Clinicians and immunization advocates should take advantage of updated resources to assist in late season flu vaccination efforts. Materials include:

## **Fall Assessment Results Coming Soon**

In addition to California's routine annual child care and kindergarten immunization assessments, in 2011 middle schools and high schools were tasked to report on Tdap immunization coverage for 7-12<sup>th</sup> graders.

Middle and high schools met the challenge to submit student Tdap vaccination data to the State. The Immunization Branch anticipates that 2011 assessment reports will available and posted online in the next months. The Branch extends its appreciation to California Immunization Coordinators who conducted follow-up to ensure the most complete possible data reporting from schools and child care centers across the state.

# **California Epi Update**

#### No Deaths from Whooping cough in 2011

After California's 2010 pertussis epidemic, data recently released for 2011 show a positive turn of events. Pertussis cases dropped from over 9,000 to about 3,000. And—for the first time in 20 years—there were no deaths at all.

Young infants are the most vulnerable to whooping cough complications. Of 575 whooping cough cases among infants 3 months of age or younger reported during 2011, 244 (42%) were hospitalized. That's a significant drop since 2010, when 59% of infected infants in that age group were hospitalized.

California's pioneering expanded Tdap vaccination recommendations for adolescents and adults, greater awareness of the disease, and more rapid diagnosis and treatment may have contributed to this positive public health outcome. ## NVAC Draft Recommendations for Health Care Work Flu Vaccinations

The National Vaccine Advisory Committee (NVAC) has issued a <u>draft report</u> and a summary of <u>public</u> <u>comments</u> on its preliminary recommendations for health care worker flu vaccinations. Among the preliminary recommendations are a goal of 90% coverage rate for influenza vaccinations among health care personnel and a call for health care facilities to *"strongly consider requiring"* influenza vaccination for their employees. The final report should be available later in 2012.

# Vaccine Bar Codes Coming

Some vaccine vials are getting a technology upgrade. Later this year, vials of sanofi pasteur DTaP and MCV4 vaccines are expected to display two-dimensional bar codes that can be read with a scanner. The codes will contain information on the vaccine's lot number and expiration date. The <u>American Academy of</u> <u>Pediatrics</u> (AAP) has prepared guidance for clinicians in using the new bar code technology. Download <u>AAP's guidance document</u> here.



# **HPV Vaccine: More Education Needed**

A recent study suggests that few adolescents perceived less need for safer sexual behaviors after the first HPV vaccination. Education about HPV vaccines and encouraging communication between girls and their mothers may prevent misperceptions among these adolescents. <u>Read more</u>.

# New Law Expands Minors' Consent for STD Prevention

A law (<u>Chapter 652, AB 499 Statutes of 2011</u>), expands California's Family Code relating to adolescents. Under the new law adolescents age 12 and older may consent to medical care to prevent a sexuallytransmitted disease (STD). While prior laws allow minors to consent to *treatment* of STDs, the new law extends their ability to consent without parent or guardian permission to preventive measures such as :

- HPV vaccination series
- Hepatitis B vaccination series
- HIV post-exposure prophylactic medication
- Other preventive STD medical services that may become available in the future.

The law does not

- Require minors to seek or receive HPV vaccination, hepatitis B vaccination, or any other preventive services
- Provide additional funding or resources for the vaccinations and other STD prevention services. Moreover, the law explicitly states that the parents or guardians of the minor are not liable for the costs of such services.

In many cases, health care providers are not permitted to share information or records regarding a minor's STD prevention services with a parent or legal guardian without the minor's written authorization. Health care providers should be aware that:

- There is no law that requires providers to record an STD vaccination in the California Immunization Registry (CAIR).
- Insurance companies may share claims information about STD prevention services with primary policy holders, such as parents.
- Immunization data about minors in CAIR and other record systems may be accessible to parents.
