SUBJECT: National Survey Shows Ways to Increase Flu Vaccination on College Campuses

Influenza activity is now widespread in California. Are your students vaccinated? Consider [findings](#) from a National Foundation for Infectious Diseases (NFID) survey for ways to increase flu vaccination rates on your campus.

Flu vaccination rates among US college students (8-39%) are significantly lower than Healthy People 2020 goals (70%).¹ While 70% of students surveyed believe it is important to get an annual flu shot, only 46% say they typically get vaccinated. Findings suggest that a strategy combining education, access, and incentives may raise vaccination rates. **Access to the vaccine at low or no cost (61%) and incentives, such as free food or gift cards (61%), were shown to have the greatest impact on student decision-making regarding flu vaccination.** Nearly half (48%) say that having the vaccine available at multiple locations on campus would increase their likelihood of getting vaccinated.
